



DESIGN PRINCIPLES:

- Low cost and low maintenance landscape 'greening' improvements.
- Landscape improvements to enhance the retail experience whilst maintaining clear pedestrian access routes.
- Introduce seasonal variety within the plant selection.
- Increase biodiversity and habitats for wildlife through plant selection.
- Introduce greater variety of structural plants within retail spaces.

Broomhill Landscape Improvements

Strategic design principles and areas for potential greening

Fulwood Road retail centre



Introduce structural plants that can withstand the often dry conditions of planters such as hebe, St John's wort (hypericum), Oregon Grape (mahonia), rosemary and ornamental grasses.

Incorporate spring bulbs within existing planters to grow between plants offering a splash of colour in spring.



Use additional planters to match existing with similar structural planting.

Possible introduction of hanging baskets where weight can be supported. Potential for green wall planting on upper storeys and green roofs could be possible. Structural surveys and detailed designs could explore these possibilities.

Parkers Lane green space

Introduction of a herb garden to increase biodiversity, wildlife benefits and introduce scent and seasonal variety.

Create a lavender hedge around seating areas and herbs behind such as sage, rosemary and oregano to provide scent and an evergreen structure next to the roses.



<u>Parkers Lane green space</u> Introduction of robust, shade tolerant and low maintenance groundcover under trees where grass is currently failing.

Suitable species include periwinkle (Vinca) and Japanese spurge (Pachysandra).



Potential to green this unused corner with planters.

Small tree such as a multi-stemmed birch could be added in a suitable planter with groundcover planting beneath.
